



Book Review By Kimberly Arend Porter

Carolyn Turgeon's "Mermaid" is not your typical tale about the mythical mermaid. You would expect the usual Walt Disney kind of version, but what you will take away from this book is far from it. This rendition follows Hans Christian Anderson's tale more closely, but the twist in this story makes it stand out in a more unique way that would appeal more to the adult demographic.

There are some things I did love about the book; the details of the water, the kingdoms, and how she explained the sea, really bring you there visually. The fine details of the mermaids and the highly detailed imagery of what Lenia (the mermaid) looked like, were a treat for my imagination. However, I did not need to be constantly reminded that her breasts were bare. The book did inspire my mind to wander, and I suddenly felt the desire to go scuba diving in an abyss. I wish that the author had given her characters more clever-sounding kingdom names rather than the boring ones she supplied them with. There were some characters that I feel, she did not develop as much, who were a whole lot more intriguing than the main characters. I would have enjoyed seeing more of them. Even the sea witch, I felt, lacked in depth of detail and character. Overall, I felt that the words flowed nicely and were pleasant to read.

I truly think that this book would have been fantastic if it weren't for the very abrupt and not so desirable ending. I felt it was put together sloppily without much thought. She goes through such trouble to adorn the almost promising book with beautiful detail throughout, only to build up to a very regretful and unsatisfying ending. It is pretty hard to explain or elaborate without spoiling. Definitely "dive" into this book if you are into reading timeless tales with a bit of a twist, but keep in mind the rigid and possibly disappointing ending. I give it a 3 out of 5 stars!





WHAT YOU NEED

You can do this meditation with or without the following items (The most important thing is to find a quiet space). I get my supplies from a local store in the Poconos called Planet Earth Gallery or www.Azuredrean.net is a great website. *Blue Calcite (Calcite is a powerful amplifier and cleanser of various types of energies. This calming stone increases psychic ability, assists in astral travel, brings about stability, and stimulates trust in oneself.)
*Your favorite Incense
*Seashells

*Seashells

Take 3 more deep cleansing breaths. Open your eyes.

Ingredients:

1 Box Cake Mix of Choice (make according to box) 1 Batch Homemade Frosting (recipe below) OR 2 Tubs Store Bought Frosting Piping Bags/ Piping tips Melting Chocolate (ie Wilton's Chocolate Wafers) Chocolate Piping Bag or Squeeze Bottle A Paint Brush

Food Coloring Sprinkles/Disco Dust/ Edible Glitter/ Etc.. Chocolate Molds Wax Paper Sharpie Marker

Homemade Buttercream or Cream Cheese Frosting: 1 Package Cream Cheese 1 Stick of Butter (If making butter cream, use two sticks of butter and omit the cream cheese) 6-8 cups of Confectioners' Sugar 1 Teaspoon Vanilla or Almond Extract for Flavor Milk (if needed for texture)

Mix together cream cheese and/or butter until soft. Add your extract until blended together. Add sugar one cup at a time until creamy and smooth. Add milk 1-2 teaspoons at a time, if needed to make the frosting softer. Add food coloring until desired color is reached.

Preheat your oven to the temperature specified on the box. Begin mixing your cake mix according to the instructions on your boxed cake and distribute evenly in to cupcake liners ***Tip from Lulu Bakes- Using a small or medium sized cookie scoop will help you measure the perfect amount of cake batter for each cupcake. I use a medium scoop and use 1.4 scoops per cupcake liner. All cupcakes should rise to the same size!

*** Place the cupcakes in the oven.

Don't forget to set your timer!

While your cupcakes are baking you can begin to make your frosting. If you are using store bought frosting simply add a little bit of food coloring at a time (100 drops of food coloring = 1 tsp) until you feel you've reached your desired color (if using homemade frosting use the steps under the recipe). Once your frosting is mixed, fill your piping bag (if using). Once your bag(s) are filled place the frosting in the refrigerator to keep cool. DO NOT skip this step if you're using store bought frosting. It is a much softer consistency than homemade frosting, and the frosting will get very warm in your hand while piping the cupcakes.

Now check on those cupcakes if you haven't done so already!

Set them aside to cool.

For the chocolate seashells I used candy molds. I buy my candy molds from Candy Land Crafts in Somerville, NJ but some popular molds can usually be found at Michael's, Hobby Lobby, or even Amazon. If you have never worked with chocolate before it is important to know that chocolate can burn very quickly. Never leave in the microwave or double broiler for too long. Constantly check it and stir to make sure you have the right texture. Once chocolate is burned there is no saving it- it tastes awful and is impossible to work with.



To melt the chocolate for the seashells I used a small chocolate piping bag (these are made by Wilton's- I bought mine at Michael's). You can also melt it inside of a plastic squeeze bottle with the cap off. Once the chocolate was melted I filled my molds and popped them in the freezer to set. They only need a few minutes in the freezer. To decorate my chocolates I used a variety of disco dusts and edible glitters, a small paint brush, and some water. ***if you have never used disco dust or edible glitters before, please do some Google research before using. Both are safe to eat and will pass through your body but neither are FDA approved)*** Dip your paint brush in water and lightly wet the chocolate (too much water will cause the chocolate to smudge and melt). Now dip the same brush in the dust or glitter of your choice (one color at a time) and brush onto your chocolate. Keep going over the same spots until the desired effect is reached. Set these aside.

For the mermaid tails lay down wax paper on your counter. With your sharple or permanent marker draw out your tails. I did this freehand, you can also print pictures and trace them. Keep in mind that chocolate spreads, so make them a little skinnier than you'd actually want it to be. Now turn your paper over- you don't want to put the chocolate directly on the marker. Melt the chocolate of your choice/color in a small bowl and add to your squeeze bottle (you'll need a lot of chocolate for this so melting directly in the bottle will take you too long). Start tracing your outlines and fill in the tails. Shake the paper around a little to spread the chocolate in to your outline. Once hard you can remove from the wax paper to decorate (about 10 minutes).

Chocolate cannot be colored with normal food coloring. Chocolate is an oil based substance and food coloring you buy in the super market is water based. Oil and water do not mix! If you put a water based coloring in your chocolate you will harden and ruin the chocolate. It's best to buy pre colored chocolate wafers or buy oil based chocolate coloring- Candy Land sells this.

You should now be ready to assemble your cupcakes. Frost the cupcakes with either your piping bag or a knife. Add your chocolate shells and mermaid tails

Watermelon Mint Juice



This is an excellent juice to bring with you to the beach since watermelon is by far one of the most hydrating fruits. Watermelon has natural electrolytes, potassium- to aid in nerve and muscle function, and also promotes healthy teeth and gums. This fruit is full of vitamins A, C, and B6.

The combination of watermelon and mint is delicious and refreshing. If you are not a fan of mint, try rosemary.

WHAT YOU NEED

- * Whole or half a seedless Watermelon (depending on how much you want)
- * Mint to taste.

DIRECTIONS

- 1. Slice your watermelon in half and scoop out all of the pink fruit.
- 2. Refrigerate the fruit for an hour or longer.
- 3. Place the cold fruit into a blender and pulse until you have a vibrant pink liquid.
- 4. Strain your juice in a fine mesh strainer for a smooth juice.
- 5. Add the mint to your juice and let it sit in the refrigerator for a half hour.
- 6. By this time, your juice should be infused with a nice sharp mint taste.

BREAKING THE MER-MOLD: BODY IMAGE

with Karina Beraldo, The Curvy Mermaid

AZ: I think it is very interesting that you decided to depict the mermaid in a way that goes against the cliche Hollywood mold, of being very thin and overly skinny. What made you decide to depict the mermaid in a more curvy form?

KB: I wanted to see how it would be accepted since it is not your typical depiction of these beautiful creatures. She was being represented in an unusual way, but to my surprise, it was received pretty well!

AZ: How do you think this will help young girls who struggle with their own body image?

KB: I think if a girl admires my work and sees that I can portray the beauty of any body shape, skin color, hair type, etc., maybe she'll look in the mirror and see more positive things about herself!

AZ: Have you gone through your own battles with body image?

KB: When I was a teenager, I was very shy and did not like to be noticed! Ironically, at this time I was skinny!
Nowadays, my only battle is to be able to buy clothes in my size, because in Brazil it is not very common that brands produce plus size collections!





AZ: If so, how did you overcome those battles?

KB: At the end of college I lost my father so it was a very sad and lonely time. I started doing belly dance to help me to lose the shyness and it helped me realized that I needed to live each moment intensely, in the memory of my father. He was such a cheerful and optimistic person! At that time, I realized that it did not matter what my weight was at, I could do whatever I wanted! I danced, I met my boyfriend, I walked with my friends regardless of my size,

and if I was ok with myself, other people were too!

AZ: What advice can you give other young girls who are struggling with their own insecurities of body image?
KB: Don't waste your time worrying about what others are thinking of you, but do what makes you happy! I like to eat, I like to go to nice restaurants and cook, and I will not stop doing it just because people think I should lose weight! You have to worry about being healthy and having fun with people! Here in Brazil, we use an expression that says "Cultivate Friendships!" Think of your life as a flower that needs nurturing to stay beautiful and healthy!

AZ: What would you like to change about the pressures that society puts on young women to look a certain way or be a certain weight?


KB: This pressure will only change when women become true masters of their bodies! We need to stop looking at each other with such critical and unfriendly eyes! What does it matter if the girl next door has short hair, or if she is fat, or not wearing any makeup?

AZ: Mermaids in pop culture are often portrayed as very sexy, provocative beings. How would you define "Sexy?" What does sexy mean to you?

KB: To me, being sexy doesn't necessarily mean "being beautiful", and it's definitely not about being mostly naked! It's the way a person moves, the things you say, the look, the things you love! CONFIDENCE! Some people say that belly dancing is sexy, but I really think it all depends on the person. I do not think I'm sexy, I'm more cheerful on stage. If you ask me who I think is sexy, I think Chris Cornell (OMG) is very sexy, Javier Bardem, but they are not necessarily handsome guys. Christina Hendricks is the epitome of a sexy and beautiful woman! Brazilian actresses Juliana Paes and Maria Fernanda Candido are extremely sexy too.

AZ: A lot of your artwork seems to be done in green & blueish tones, or sea/ocean/mermaid related. Please tell our readers, what intrigues you about these themes?

TY: Well, I have always loved green, and of course it finds its way into my art because of that. I grew up on the west coast of Canada and did scuba diving quite a bit in the Pacific Ocean in my late teens. I believe those experiences most likely influenced my inner teens. I believe those experiences most likely influenced my inner visions greatly. The sea is very captivating and the places that I've lived over my lifetime tend to be sea coasts. Oh, and my father was a fishing captain, so maybe I just didn't have a choice? Surrounded by the sea, sounds exotic, doesn't it? Hahah!







AZ: What is it about mermaids that inspires you to paint them?


My name is Kharis Ashley. I am 26 and currently live in Boulder, Colorado.





A Heart to Heart with Marvin Sunk

Its members hail from the Bayshore area of New Jersey making Marvin Sunk a seven piece live band with their own unique brand of genrebending rock, jazz, hip-hop and electronica, to which the members and their fans lovingly refer to as "True Grit". With 4 EPs to date and working on their debut album "50,000" from its 2007 humble beginnings as an "In-house" studio project, Marvin Sunk is Casey Burd (Vocals/Trombone), Kilday (Guitar/Vocals), Mike "The Haug" Haughey (Guitar), Tristan Berry (Drums), Ed Marshall (Keys), Joe Stahl (Trumpet), and Stephan Demergis (Bass/Vocals).

Renee: There is no doubt after listening to more than one Marvin Sunk recording that you've honed a unique and recognizable sound all your own. Was this unique sound something you've progressed into from the onset of Marvin Sunk or was it purposely founded-Which leads me to wonder how its players amongst the youngest of Marvin Sunk to the oldest by the way of musical experience and background makes up the talent for your unique blend of instruments?

Casey: I suppose the "unique" sound comes from the different musical backgrounds each of us has. We've all played in several different bands prior to Marvin Sunk and I know the genres of each range from rock, to metal, to jazz, to classical, to ska, to funk, to you name it. I don't think we all sat down and said, "Hey, let's mix all of these styles together", rather it just kind of happened that way by each member's musical preference when writing songs.

Stephan: The younger guys have older influences than this older guy; it has actually awakened or introduced styles. It feels like I never realized

they were a part of my musical upbringing.

The Haug: I would say Marvin Sunk's collective sound is a mixture of our influences. Most of us play multiple instruments, which enables us to be more mindful of stepping on each other's toes. In that way, I would say the sound has been cultivated through the years to blend into what we do.

Renee: What are the driving influences or inspiration to write such layered vocals and instrumentals? Much like my experience engaged in some Pink Floyd, I find it hard to listen without being immediately stimulated into wanting a cinematic visual to go along with the instrumentation....

Casey: When it comes to each section of the music, the shifts in major & minor are something that I think all of us in the band are attracted to. I personally like to be challenged as a listener, chord-wise. I'm very much affected by the way certain chords make me "feel". More often than not, when it comes to our music, I find that many sections could be considered major AND minor or happy AND sad at the same time. For me, this is the core of the music that I love to make. Some of my favorite music tends to make me feel elated and melancholy at the same time. Kilday: It's not something that's planned, it just kind of happens. I tend to go for the foulest chord or note myself...sometimes it works, other times not so much. That's the beauty of how well we work together, we can throw anything at the wall and see if it sticks. I'm a big fan of classical music, so making a landscape of sounds layer-wise is the best. I like to listen to music that I'd consider ear candy, and I'd say we do that from time to time with the instrumentation and vocals.

The Haug: Our songs are so layered, mainly because we have so many people in the band. Sometimes too many parts or overdubs can take away from the song and have it get lost. With Marvin Sunk, we approach each part carefully and explore if it adds a new dynamic, or discern if it clutters the frequencies.

Renee: How hard is it to assemble the 7 players that make up Marvin Sunk in getting the new album "50,000" closer to its completion?

The Haug: The hardest part is working around all of our schedules in order to practice, write, and record. Some of us are in other bands or musical situations that take time away. One thing that is great about this band is that we all really do like making music together. If it's a recording session, rehearsal, or a gig, you will see us with the same energy and focus to make something that sounds great.

Kilday: Honestly, it's not too bad, sure we all have our families and regular jobs to deal with but we all make time for the band. We've been working on the album a long time, but we're closer now than

we've ever been to finishing it finally;

Joe Stahl: As one of the newest members of Marvin Sunk, I was a fan of the music before I joined the band. I loved the band, but it was so unlike anything I had ever done, completely out of my comfort zone. It wasn't always easy, but I think I've found my place. And I hope that my presence makes a great band just a little bit better. Kilday: Having Joe in our band makes it a LOT better!

Renee: How many songs will be released with the new album and what studio are you recording the production in? Tell us what has been the best part of the process in building this body of work for "50,000".

Kilday: We have 4 or 5 more songs to cut and we've got most of the rest that we've already recorded pretty close to a final mix. Throughout the process we've continued to write more music so I'd say the process is never ending, which is okay with me...We may end up with a double album, at least that's where it's heading, so that could be 20+ songs. It's a lot to digest sure, but I believe the songs are interesting enough to keep a listener engaged

Casey: One of the best parts of this process has been the fact that we are recording in Kilday's house, and we're not on the clock!! With that luxury in mind, we've been able to take our time to flesh out ideas for each song. The process has been incredibly enjoyable, a process which I often refer to as "Deep Fried Convenience".

Renee: Your new album '50,000"---What is the reason for wanting to offer this new work as a vinyl production? And will it be available digitally to your fans as well? As a musician in the age of technology, where does Marvin Sunk stand on the distribution of your music?

Kilday: We're going to do all of the regular digital media, CDs & digital downloads, but for me, vinyl is another way to go as well. I still prefer listening to wax over CDs any day of the week. Additionally, the album art comes into play; why go through all of the trouble of putting together a cool image for the cover if no one can really appreciate it? And I've always loved looking at the cover and being able to read the liner notes and lyrics while listening to a record.

The Haug: As a local musician, it is very difficult to get your music heard at all. Our goal is to get people involved and into our songs. This

album is unique in that we want them to stand as just that- an album.

people will enjoy listening to them as an experience, not just a one off.

We have a vision of what these songs can become and believe that

Renee: Who produced your video production of your song "Patchwork Salad" and how old is this song? The Kaleidoscope artwork makes this production so much fun to watch! Kilday: That's Joe Stahl...he killed it (laughs)...It's pretty old; the song has been around since just before Marvin Sunk got started. It's a fun one to play live! A little background on the song itself, the music came from a jam during a party I was at. I was just messing around on an acoustic guitar that was there and the lyrics came on the way to work the next day while I was on the train heading into Newark, NJ. Honestly, I just wanted to write a "drug" song like you used to hear in the 60s and 70s and I guess we've got our own spin on it, but that was the motivation for it.

Renee: Not only is your sound unique but your branding has its own pop art punch to entertain your fans as well---What is the inspiration for the band's name that is being transferred in your branding and who is responsible for the artwork?

Casey: The inspiration for the band's name came from the infamous 1970s Beatles inspired film, Sgt. Pepper's Lonely Hearts Club Band. Marvin Sunk is a character played by Alice Cooper in the film.

Kilday: I do the artwork; Photoshop is a lot of fun! I can definitely say that! Mainly I just enjoy making something that you kind of can't look away from; our mascot "Marvin" has been on almost all of our fliers. I can think of only maybe two (and that would have been before I started using him as our de facto mascot) that he wasn't on the flier.

Renee: Marvin Sunk's harmonic vocals are as interesting and unpredictable as the blend of its 7 different instruments, it's clear they hold equal weight to your unique sound. Personally, when I first heard the band's vocals it was a delightful and refreshing unexpected surprised. What are the influences shaping how you design the use of vocals in your production?

Casey: I think the desire for layered harmonic vocals comes from the fact that MARVIN SUNK is made up of a bunch of Beatles' fans. Most of us grew up listening to them and quite honestly, never stopped listening. Most bands that I'm personally drawn to have multiple singers or multiple harmonies: The Beatles, Eagles, Failure, Stereolab,

QOTSA, Grizzly Bear and Annuals, etc.

Kilday: 10cc also comes to mind when it comes to vocals. I'm also a huge fan of Motown, I mean, hell, I grew up listening to Cousin Brucie in the back of the station wagon. Scott Muni from 102.7 FM was definitely a big deal for me as well. I'd call it an education really, Prof. Muni taught me well and he is sorely missed on the radio waves. So really, from a production standpoint, taking in all of the influences we have really does make a difference when we're trying to get a sound or feel for how the music and vocals blend together.

Renee: Dreams? Goals? and Expectations? We all have them. Marvin Sunk's members, both separately and collectively, what are they all hoping for down the road?

Joe Stahl: I don't want to speak for anyone else. Solely speaking for myself, the only expectation I have is making the best music possible that pleases all of the members of the band. In doing so, I think other people will like it if they are exposed to it and give it a chance. I have no expectations of superstardom, or making any money from it and I'm fine with that. It is my creative outlet, and it pleases me. If other people like it, then that will make it all the more satisfying to me. Kilday: Yes, making loads of money and being a superstar, I don't expect that to happen either...at this point could that even happen with the industry the way it is? I'd say it's doubtful... I just want to make lots of music that sounds cool to me...Dreams? I barely sleep so I don't have many of those...Goals? To always keep making music. Stephan: It's always a good time playing with this group of guys...that's a dream. The goal can be just do this for a long time...Expectations? I expect you'll have to kill me to get me out of this band...

Kilday: There it is! Renee thanks so much! We all appreciate you taking the time to speak to us. And to those reading, keep listening...Cheers!

She opens up her more than theatrical stage show with her underwater themed set dressed to perfection: Projectors and fog machines fill the room with the luminous mystery that only deep sea divers experience in the depths of the ocean. She takes the stage dressed from head to toe in Mermaid Couture, complete with her entourage of backup dancers circling around her like sea sirens, calling and pulling her viewers into often dark and dangerous realms. In other scenes, her music is more soft and serene like the gentle caress of the seaside. If there is one thing Ariel Undine is known for, it's her ability to take her audience into another dimension.

Her passion for mer-folk started from birth in Hollywood, California. Coincidentally enough, she was born through water birth and was actually adorned with the name Ariell Her mother named her after the choir of angels that she heard as she was giving birth and saw a spiritual bright white light.

Ariel was born 40 percent deaf in each ear and used vibrations to connect with music. At the age of 6 she started to draw Mermaids while listening to music. Each new mermaid she drew took on a new shape, form, or color, almost like the frequencies of the musical track she was listening to. She then started to write her own material, poems that eventually turned into musical lyrics, pieced together with rhythm and beats that she would hear like an orchestra in her head. A lot of her songs are featured around fantasy themes such as faeries, unicorns, dragons, mystical creatures, pirates, sea witch, undines, and mermaids.

Her subject matter started to take shape after a very inspiring boat trip to the Catalina Islands. She looked into the water and actually saw dolphins! Her vivid imagination took over, as she dreamt up visions of mermaids swimming along with them. It was as if she could see a doorway into their invisible world. She was so inspired by this experience that she wrote a book called "The Otherworld", which is based on her theories about an invisible dimension underneath the ocean.

The way that Ariel views mermaids are not stereotypical with long blonde hair sitting on a rock, looking beautiful to behold. She imagines mermaids to be very alien, otherworldly, and almost fierce and reptilian. To Ariel, they would not resemble humans in the slightest. They would be very animalistic with neon catlike eyes that glow in the dark. She pictures gills on the sides of their neck, long talons and webbed hands, with fangs in their mouths. The fishlike scales on their tails would have all of the vivid colors of a tropical fish, almost lighting up the water like electrical currants. She imagines their skin to be blue or green to match their hair, long and flowing like silk. They would also swim at almost lightning fast speed so they are invisible to the human eye.

She believes that just because we can't see these mystical beings, it does not mean they do not exist! Mermaids are very real to the songstress, and she has felt such a strong connection with these beings that she believes she may have been one in her past life. She also changed her last name to Undine for the stage. The Word UNDINE literally means water spirit, which she feels represents her: an Angel Water spirit!

Ariel began to merge her love of mermaids & singing together around the age of 18. She devoted all of her time & money to her concept, from paying producers to buying costumes & makeup, to hiring dancers and producing merchandise. She is also currently in the process of making music videos for all of her songs! She describes her sound as Dark Gothic Electronica, poetic lyrics with haunting overtones. Some of it is uplifting and ethereal and some very mysterious and dark. Her passion lies in telling a story through her music, and taking the listeners to another place and time.

During her time with her band "The Pirate's Siren" in Hollywood, the sound of her vocals were often compared to that of Queen of Goth, Siouxsie Sioux. Ariel also admires artists such as BJORK, who is so otherworldly and unusual but maintains who she is, even through mainstream acceptance. That is something every artist struggles with, it seems. Ariel realizes the odds there are against her alternative route in her music, but does not let that discourage her. She states, "I do not really want to go mainstream with my music as I refuse to be molded and would rather be more underground and unique, than just a carbon copy of everyone else."

She knows that it takes belief and confidence in herself to carry on despite the struggle to be heard in today's industry. Platforms like You Tube, which give artists a sense of independence and freedom to show their art to the masses visually, have been helpful in marketing. It takes a true performer to know your audience, and Ariel has no qualms about sticking to venues that are more accepting of her image and music. She has performed all over from clubs and festivals in Hollywood, to Las Vegas and London (Alternative Music Festival). This summer she will be performing by the ocean in Cornwall at the Faery Festival, which is dedicated to everything ethereal and mystical! This will be her second year performing at the festival, organized by the brilliant visionary Karen Kay. Her favorite thing about performing at the event is watching the children's eyes light up to see a mermaid singing on stage. It is so inspiring for Ariel to see future generations get inspired by her act! Some even ask her if she is a real mermaid! Of course she says YES!

Ariel says, "All I want to do is inspire people with my vision... Becoming a professional mermaid has changed my life because I can sing for other people now and share some magic... And Glitter, don't ever forget the GLITTER!"

Q&A With Ariel Undine!

AZ: Mermaids love to hang out on the beach. What are some of your

favorite beaches you have visited?

AU: I simply adore Ibiza Spain, I feel very drawn to that place! I have been there many times and I would love to have my own house there one day. I would design an underwater themed house! Also, Malibu is so nice and I would love to go to Hawaii, my dream destination!

AZ: The ocean is a mysterious place. Please tell us some of your favorite

AU: My favorite sea creature is definitely a dolphin, playful and fun. It is my dream to swim with one. I also find jellyfish and sea horses such enchanting little creatures.

AZ: What is your favorite thing about being a mermaid and what is your

AU: The best thing about being a mermaid is being able to sing and use my operatic voice to feel close to heaven and angels; it's a very ethereal thing for me. Also, having a tail is a powerful thing underwater; the sleek scales can move fast and furious! I love being in water feeling the freedom of swimming! My least favorite is... well, on stage it's hard to move around as fast as I'd like! Hal

AZ: What are some of your favorite pop culture bits about mermaids? (Movies, music, and books ect.)

AU: SPLASH was my ultimate favorite film as a child; I think her tail was very realistic and the underwater scenes were just magical! I met TAILMAN "TOM SHOUSE", who designed Daryl Hannah's tail and I also met Daryl Hannah in Hollywood. I think I could die a happy mermaid to meet my heroes! He is such an inventive and hardworking man, a real inspiration to the such as the such as the second transition and hardworking man, a real inspiration to the such as the such as the second transition and the such as the making a dream turn into reality and making money from his passion.

AZ: Do you make your own Costumes? If not, where do you get your

lovely outfits?

AU: Yes I do make some of my costumes with design concepts that I have, with materials such as Metallic PVC and Spandex. The more complicated costumes are made out of latex by London based genius AMY DAY. She is incredible! I have spent years designing mermaid tails and dresses, but found them hard to maneuver around the stage, so I went to her and she has invented mermaid leggings made of latex with scales! They look very rubbery and fishlike and when the legs are crossed it can be a tail! She is a very inventive lady! Check out her online website AM STATIK.

AZ: Mermaids were always portrayed in fairytales as these mysterious creatures with beautiful hair and make up! What are some of the colors to use in your palette for dressing the part? Do you have any favorite make

up brands?
AU: I mostly go for blues and greens. I mix them with different shades of ice blues and light blues on my eyes and dark blue on my lips. I like to match them with the same color wig I wear. I'm not a fan of mixing colors; if I choose blue, it stays blue. I'll also add black eyeliner, lashes, and glitter. Sometimes I'll add a dash of silver when I'm going for a space age, futuristic look. Occasionally I wear purples mixed with blue. If I have a green theme it's the same green wig and a combination of different color greens on my eyes and lips. I love Star Gazer make up, which I have been using for years. I even wrote a song called "Stardust" based on wearing that make up! that make up!

AZ: Did you start singing before or after you decided you wanted to be a

AU: I always remember singing as a child, but I had a poignant event that I remember very clearly when I was a teenager. It was at festival by the sea in Cornwall, England and I remember singing for a long time in the water. All of the sudden, my voice magically seemed to open up and I could sing high opera tics very well! I never really hit those notes before, so I could not believe it was coming out of me! I remember feeling very inspired. I had a vision of wanting to perform at festivals as a mermaid, emerging from giant shell and an underwater sea themed stage, combining opera and electroncia together. I also remember feeling as if the mermaids in the ocean that I was swimming in, gave me a new, more nowerful voice It was a heautiful moment. powerful voice! It was a beautiful moment.

AZ: Have you ever been deep-sea scuba diving? If so please share you

AU: Yes, I actually have a Padi certificate in scuba diving, but my Au: Yes, I actually have a Paci certificate in scuba diving, but my experience was not so nice. I did it in England where even in the summer the water is freezing even with a wetsuit on! Also, the water is murky so I would NOT recommend it! I think if you are going to go scuba diving, go somewhere hot where the marine life is exotic and colorful. Go where you can relax and not worry about freezing your bones off. You can enjoy the variety of fish and creatures so much more; all I saw was a dismal frog on a murky little leaf- that was it! Lo!!

AZ: Please tell our readers one thing they may not know about Mermaids!

AU: We cry a lot which is why we look younger than our years! Release the poison! Eternal youth and mermaid tears! Mermaids are very emotional creatures. I think part of it is wondering what they are doing here on earth and what their mission is! It can get confusing in human skin! But they have big hearts that feel strongly and when we love, it is so deep that it hurts our soul sometimes. In the human form, we feel every emotion to the extreme and cannot hide it very well. In that respect we are totally honest and what you see is what you get. In retrospect, half the time we are confused by the human race and the other half we are fascinated, but some of the cruel things that humans can do hurt our mer-hearts deeply. We are fiercely loyal to those we love and protect anyone in danger. We are also free spirits! We love our freedom and we cannot be tied down or controlled in any way or we will break free and swim away! We do not always do things that make sense, but what do you expect? We are from another realm, but we will make your life fun, imaginative, mystical, artistic, dreamy, deeply loving, and magical!

AZ: What are some projects you have in the works?

AU: I will be uploading a music video for my song "Seawitch" in the near future, which is about the Medusa inspired myth. The opening lines to the song are, "Hubble-bubble, here comes trouble...Down from the ocean's floor. More like a dark shark, than the girl next door!" The music video floor...More like a dark shark, than the girl next door!" The music video will be very dark and mysterious with serpentine elements. It will be set underwater with pirate ships and dead souls of the ocean. It is definitely one of my darker songs with an edge. I am also working on another video for one of my love songs called "CRASH!" The music video will be of me as a sci-fi mermaid, and it will be wild! I cannot wait to shoot it!

AZ: If you ever met a real live mermaid what would you say to her?

"Take me back to your World!" Thank You So Much! It's been MER-MAGICAL! Ariel Undine





AZ: What made you want to start making jewelry?

DD: I used to work at a handmade cosmetics shop where I worked my way up from sales assistant to manager and trainer. I was very interested in the creative process of handmade products and the character and quality that comes with that. I always wanted to create products, I was very fascinated by that. One day one of my colleagues came to work and showed me and some other colleagues what she'd been making with polymer clay the day before at home. She had made a charm bracelet with tiny little cookies and ice cream cones. I was instantly smitten with the material! I bought my very first blocks of Fimo that very day and haven't been without a piece of clay in my hand ever since. At first I made what my colleague made, to try it, but after a few days, my hands went in another direction and I started making owls and skullies and embellishing old earrings with a rudimentary version of the flowers I make now. I knew right away that nothing would make me happier than being able to earn my living by making and selling my clay pieces. It took me almost a year to actually go through with that, though. The pieces like my witches, mermaids, and fairies started developing soon after I had started my business.

the materials you use in your jewelry making

DD: My most important material is polymer clay. I also use a lot of rhinestones that can handle the oven heat that is needed to cure the clay. I often mount my clay cameos on filigrees. I also often combine my clay ornament pieces with crochet and art yarn pieces. I have a very serious yarn addiction! My favorite is hand dyed hand spun yarn. Other than that, I love my millinery flowers and leaves collection for my hats and headdresses, and I love using feathers and beads to embellish as well.

What is your favorite thing about making jewelry?

DD: My favorite thing is turning the little stories in my head into visual clay pieces and every time the excitement of seeing it takes form and it turns out even better than I'd hoped. Next to that, my greatest passion is color. I love being able to mix any color I want with my clay.

AZ: How long does it take you to make each piece?

DD: That really depends on the piece. The smaller earnings can be done within an hour or two. Pieces like my mermaids can easily take 2 or 3 working days. I don't stop until it feels exactly right to me. My love is in the details. I don't just want a mermaid, I want her to have an actual little world around her and let her background details tell just as much of the story of the little scene as the mermaid herself.

DD: I do take some inspiration from books, movies, music, but it always turns into my own interpretation. I really love fairy tales and making up my own fairy tales.

DD: Gosh! That is a hard one! I don't think I could choose between my witches, mermaids, and fairies. I love them all equally, I can tell you that my very favorite things to sculpt are mermaids' tails and fairy's wings. And I love being able to give my little ladies skin and hair colors that human beings don't naturally have, like blue or green skin and purple and black streaked hair. I do make sure though that when I give my characters natural skin colors, I don't only make white characters. I make dark skinned characters as well, because I want all my fans to feel represented in my work.

DD: I love crochet and art yarns. Lately I've discovered needle felting and I love it!! But I always use my clay as well. My clay work is the center of my work.


AZ: What intrigues you about mermaids?

DD: I guess next to always imagining what it would be like to have such a powerful tail and feeling the movement of that body through the water, it is the idea of a creature that is both very alike to us humans but also so very different. I always wonder what it would be like to live in the ocean and I always wonder if there are villages, cities and palaces on the bottom. I also like the idea of mermaids being able to play with such beautiful sea creatures like dolphins, whales, seals and sea horses.

AZ: What would you say to a mermaid, if you were to ever meet one? DD: I don't know, actually, the first thing that comes to mind right now, is asking whether the pollution of the sea affects their lives a lot.

AZ: If you were a mermaid, what would you want your mermaid name to

DD: I really like the name Morwenna (which I already used for one of my mermaid pieces), so I'll go with that one.



AZ: Tell our readers a little bit about your jewelry making

DD: This also depends on what I'm making. Usually it starts with a vague image in my head when it's a smaller flower piece. Then I go through my clay collection and take out the colors that speak to me at that moment, mix some, if I have to, and just let my hands go. I don't think very much when I make these pieces, I just let my hands and eyes decide what goes where. When it's a large 'story/character' piece like a mermaid, it starts with the almost formed idea of a character and a tiny snapshot moment of her story. Those pieces, I write down and give myself a day or more to mull over, to see what details form in my head. Then I go through my filigree collection to see which one would suit my plans (if I need to, I first patina it in a different color) and make the background. Making the background for a large piece exactly the way I want it, takes a few hours, so I often do that the night before I want to start sculpting, so I don't lose sculpting time during the day. I prefer sculpting in the morning and afternoon, in the daylight, so I don't want to lose too many hours of that making a background. I usually wake up all excited to start my new little lady and when I'm in my zone, I totally lose track of time. I love how pieces of clay become a creature under my hands. I make the little lady first and then I make the details surrounding her.

AZ: Are each of your pieces unique, or would you recreate a piece as a custom order if someone saw something in your gallery that was already sold?

DD: My flower pieces can usually be easily recreated, so can my skully, bat, toadstool, etc-pieces. My character/story pieces are one of a kind pieces. I would take a custom order to kind of recreate a character piece, but I wouldn't be able to make it exactly the same. I don't work with molds, I sculpt freely from what comes out of my hands, so it's never possible to make the face exactly the same or make the hair flow exactly the same, for instance.

AZ: Your jewelry is so bright and colorful! What are your favorite colors to work with?

DD: My favorite color scheme is jewel tones, particularly purple, royal blue, turquoise, teal, and emerald. I also really love fiery and Autumn colors.

What you will need:

A Clean Glass Jar
Mixing Containers (2)
Epsom Salt
Course Sea Salt
Colorant
Dried Lavender
Dried or crushed Thyme
Dried or crushed Sage



How to:

- 1. Mix salts together adding herbs, then separate into two containers.
- 2. Color one of the salts and leave the other plain.
- 3. Layer colors in a clean glass jar.
- 4. Sprinkle more lavender on top and then tightly close jar.
- 5. Add your own personal decorative style to the jar for completion.

*Providing a scoop makes it extra special if gifting your salt. Be creative and alter this recipe to your own liking to personalize it.

The Filigree Company is a mythological world of handmade creatures and their stories! The Nashville, TN based company was started up by a husband & wife team, Celena Cavala and Martin Obakke in 2009. They borrow their company name from the beautiful intricate jewelry style, much like metal lace or a decorative spider web. They LOVE to weave things together, be it stories, dolls, art, etc., to create a piece that is unique.


Martin does the sculpting and the beautifully detailed illustrations, while Celena does the clothing and writes the stories. They come up with their concepts together; Martin sketches a scene based on ideas (color schemes, concepts, sizes), while Celena will sew the dresses and body. After these

with a delicate silk overlay and soldered copper. Celena likes to use light, airy, natural fabrics such as silk and cotton voiles, which she then dyes. She usually makes the clothing but sometimes Martin will sculpt little silken jackets and other embellishments. They'll then take their fancy portraits to display on their Facebook page for their ever growing fan base, which has expanded globally!

Each doll takes about two days to complete, unless it's a brand new concept they are working up. The dolls range in size from mainly about 7 inches to 14 inches, however they have made smaller and *much* larger ones as well. All of the hard work and handcrafting that goes into each and every unique piece justifies the \$200-\$600 price range, depending on the size and amount of work that goes into each doll.

The couple take their inspiration from mythological tales, nature, storytellers, and even fashion. They immerse themselves in the art of storytelling which is what draws them to create items in the fantasy realm. They have a love for paying attention to detail, which they love to explore while creating. They look to many of their favorite artists, who they feel have shaped their personal artistic style, such as Kai Nielsen, Arthur Rackham, and Daniel Merriam more currently. They marvel at the styles of Art Nouveau, Pre-Raphaelite, and a dash of Pop Surrealism. They mix that with a little bit of old school fairy tale and sprinkle the rest with some modern influences to get their extremely unique end product.


Even though doll making seems to be their main gig, this duo has their hands in many other creative areas of their business! Martin also illustrates for their clothing line, Carousel Ink which according to their site, is a whirlwind of "Carnival Nights, Steampunk Dreams, and a Menagerie of Fantasy". They specialize in bringing fairytale imagery to modern apparel. They also sell prints of Martin's Illustrations in their ETSY print shop! Many of the preliminary doll sketches are included as special one of a kind prints with the dolls but not available for sale. They have also written 7 fairytale newspapers filled to the brim with stories and illustrations and have also dabbled in creating children's stories as well, which they plan to continue in the future!





He told us about the Obsidian, which is naturally formed volcanic glass that was found on the bottom of the ocean. It turns a gold hue when placed in the light. The ancient Mayans, the REAL LIFE MERMAIDS, would free dive, holding their breath into the depths of the ocean to chisel off this Obsidian and bring it back to use in everyday rituals, or in making tools, spears, etc. for survival.

The Mayans relied heavily on nature to give them the answers, the secrets to life. They relied on the sun, the moon, the stars, and Mother Earth to build their empire. They were the most technologically advanced civilization for their time, and when the Spaniards invaded the Yucatan, they sadly tried to destroy most of the Mayan culture. Angel also made sure that he made the distinction that the Mayans and the Aztecs were in no way shape or form related, as Hollywood and American Stereotypes have brainwashed us to think. They actually did not even exist within the same time period, the Mayans establishing their civilization around 2000 BC and ruling their empire until the Spaniards arrived around 900 AD, where the Aztecs did not even establish their empire until about 1400 AD.

There were many interesting facts that Angel enlightened us about, especially with the cuisine. In the Yucatan, burritos do not exist because they don't have access to livestock such as cattle or pig, like they do in Northern Mexico. In the Yucatan, they feed mostly on fish & other seafood. Also, tacos here were flat, and soft shelled. If you wanted a taco shell here, it is actually called a Tostada. They season their seafood tacos with fresh ingredients like lemon or lime, garlic, cilantro, and fresh salsa that they called "Ay Ay Ay"! This "Ay Ay Ay" salsa contained 10 habanero peppers for every 1 tomato, NOW THAT'S HOT!

We also learned that the hammock is the bed of the Yucatan, since the swinging motion simulates a breeze in the conditions of extreme heat and humidity. Angel also stopped at other things along the way like ginormous ant hives in trees. Since the ground is filled with water, the ants had to adapt to new habitats off of the ground.



We also spotted some wild guati, which looks like a weird combination of a monkey, raccoon, and ardvark or anteater. Before we got to the ruins, we also stopped along some large trees which the Mayans used for many things. They believed that the spirits of the dead would pass through these trees into other worlds because of how hollow it was. They also used the hollow trees as drums as music was a huge part of ancient ceremony. Since the ground is rich in limestone, the trees would absorb a lot of the water into the base, so this was another way the Mayans would use nature in their survival. The leaves would also produce cotton, which is how they made their linens. They really found uses for everything around them.

We finally came to the area of the ruins which were just beyond breathtaking. There were iguanas and large lizards everywhere you turned, but they didn't bother you if you didn't bother them. These ruins overlooked a white sand beach that lead out to beautiful crystal clear blue waters!! It was unfortunately closed this day due to high tide, so we couldn't go down and explore. Anyway, the ruins were built in such a way that allowed them to withstand the conditions of erosion over time. They were built at an angle which allowed ocean water, wind, and other precipitation to just go in one direction and roll right off rather than sit on the ruins and destroy things faster. This trip was just a wealth of information that is hard to come by here in the brainwashed & misinformed USA.

Angel himself is of Mayan heritage and told us things that are not commercially advertised properly here in the US. We see so many stereotypes here, and he really made it his #1 priority to open our eyes to the truth of the Mayan culture & history. He also told us that this tour was the least popular excursion of all of the excursions that Carnival has to offer. It saddened Avi and I, because most people go on these cruises to just sit on a beach all day. I think that's what separates vacationers from travelers. We were the Scallywags in this case, seeking out adventure in learning more about this ancient rich culture! When you go to a new place, try to learn about the CULTURE! Sure beaches are nice, but you can do that anywhere! I am SO grateful for my experience at the Ancient Ruins of Tulum in Cozumel, Mexico.







Day 4, our adventures were in Belize! This place was probably the most adventurous due to the physical activities that we chose to take part in this day! We went zip lining through the jungles and cave tubing! I was extremely nervous about the zip lining, but we'll get to that in a sec. The ship didn't dock here, but anchored, so we had to take a tender to shore. It was maybe a 15 minute ride and I was able to keep my nausea in check. We then took a bus ride from the shore to the theme park which was a little over an hour long. Our tour guide, Niori was a nice Belizian guy who informed us that our time with him would be in fact "UN-BELIZE-ABLE!" He also gave us a little insight to the culture on this rather new independent nation.

Belize used to be the Republic of Honduras, under British rule until about 1983 or so. The main dialect on the island is not French Kriol, but Belizian Kriol. The phrase of the trip was "YAH MAN!" Upon pulling out of the bus station we drove through the streets of Belize City, in which Niori told us that there are only 7 traffic lights on the whole island of Belize, and only 6 of them work. That was assuring! There is also only one cinema and one bowling alley on the whole island. Currency in Belize is double the USD, so gas prices there are about \$12, which is about \$6 a gallon, USD. We should feel lucky things for us here are still hovering below the \$4 mark (well, in Jersey anyway). On this bus ride we also passed a school, and a cemetery in which the tombs were oddly above ground. Niori explained to us that this was because if you dig past 3 feet underground you hit water. So in the case of a husband and wife being buried together, the first person was buried 3 feet underground, and then the second person was just placed on top of the ground, to equal 6 feet. Belize is also known for its export of tropical produce such as mangos, oranges, pineapples, coconuts, etc. He said about 97% of the oranges found in Florida orange juices comes from Belize. Do not believe the 100% Florida Oranges Labels! He also explained why cashews are so expensive here in the US! They are one of the most dangerous nuts to harvest. Cashews actually grow in a fruit, which looks like a cross between a red bell pepper and an apple. The nut rests on top. You can not eat the fruit because it is highly toxic. In order to extract the nut from the fruit and dry them, they must take them out into a field and burn them which produces a chemical so potent that it could blind you! This dangerous process is why we pay so much for these nuts! We take for granted the things we have no idea went into making such a small tin of nuts.

As we indulged on all of this information, we made our way into a more rural area of the island. In the distance, we could see a mountain range that locals call "The Sleeping Giant". It looks like the profile of a large man's head lying face up. Niori said that's where we were headed, and to be aware, for the place we were going to be inhabiting for the afternoon was called Jaguar Paw Park, and that actual Jaguars do live there! They do not believe in restricting their wildlife from where they want to go, just for the sake of tourism, but he did assure us that they would see us, before we saw them, and they would actually avoid us. Trust me, this did not put my mind at ease one bit!! I just tried to ignore this information and enjoy the day. The park was actually quite lovely, and I did feel safe there. There were multiple tour groups here so Niori decided to give us a code name so we knew when we had to meet up throughout the day. He called us Niori's Legendary Crazy Cashew Nuts, and we would respond with a "YAH MAN!" Avi and I suited up into our zipline gear (which was pretty heavy) and hiked about a half mile uphill into the Belizian jungle to our safety briefing with a little island man named Richard! After that, we walked more and got in line on a staircase leading up to a platform high in the trees.

I was shaking in anxious anticipation as we waited in line to do the first line (which was the longest, and highest, at about 200 ft). Yea, cuz that's not scary! The workers would yelp like monkeys across the way to the guy at the other end of the line, to let them know when they were ready for the next victim. I went ahead of Avi, and he filmed my first zip line. The look on my face was definitely one of uncertainty, but ultimately you could hear the relief in my "WOOHOO!" as I ascended into the jungle at lightning speed. The wind rushed past my body as I floated upon the canopy of palms, ferns, and mahogany trees which are native to this land. I remember doing what they tell you not to do, which was looking down! I WANTED to see how high I was, to seize just how adventurous this whole experience actually was. As I made it to the other side, Avi close behind me, I felt all of the adrenaline rush out of me, totally stoked that there were 4 more lines to come! This was by far one of the most adventurous things I have ever done.

After the zip line, we had regrouped with Niori before being sent off with our cave tubing guide, Peter. We got on our water shoes, lifejackets, and light helmets with neon green inflatable tubes in hand, as we trudged up another mountain toward the caves. Peter stopped every now and then at different trees marked with signs to identify them. We saw Mahogany Trees, Prickly Yellows, Cotton Trees, and Coconut Trees. We finally arrived to the clearing, the entrance of the cave which was surrounded by lush greenery and fresh water filled with tiny little clear harmless minnows. There were about 10 people in our group, 2 people per row, all hooked together by putting their legs under the person's armpit in front of them. Avi and I were placed in the back so it was a bit hard to hear our tour guide with about 5 other tours going on in front and behind us. Even if you whisper in a cave, the sound just bounces around, so all it sounded like was a trail of echoes. I got a few bits of information, like the red deposits on the ceiling were iron, and there were also limestone deposits. Also the Mayans used to come into these caves to perform sacred rituals. There was also a section of the cave that was exposed to light, due to a sinkhole that had collapsed the earth where that part of the cave was. The water in the cave was shallow for the most part, but went up to 40 feet deep in some parts. I did witness a fruit bat flying through the cave upon entering. They live in the holes of the cave ceiling and eat up to 1000 insects per hour.

The cave tubing was fun, but the zip lining totally took the cake here. We headed back to the lockers, put some dry clothes on, and headed to the bar for some grub before heading back to the ship. We feasted upon some delicious authentic Belizian cuisine, stewed chicken, rice & beans, and cole slaw. Avi also got us some chicken tacos and we washed it all down with some cold Belikins, The Beer of Belize. After, we hit the gift shop and then boarded the bus to head back to the port. We had a wonderful time here, and we left with great knowledge of this beautiful island. Niori taught us one more phrase to take home, when asked where we went on our adventures, we should say in Belizian Kriol "Ahm be gone, ahm Belize!"

The first thing you notice when waking up in the port of Roatan, is the huge abandoned ship which has rusted over and partially sunken into the bed of the ocean. It looks like something out of a movie set, like it had been placed there for tourists to get a kick out of. Upon exiting the ship at the port in Roatan, everything seemed like a big party. There were islanders banging on drums and dancing around to the tribal grooves, pulling in tourists to dance with them. They danced like they were conjuring up spirits, or ridding their bodies of evil forces. On this day, we enjoyed our excursion along with my friend Kristin, her mom Jackie, Jackie's friend Cheryl, and Kristin's boyfriend David. We found our tour bus shortly after watching the dancing fiasco.

We were greeted by our tour guide, Joy. She was very funny and knowledgable about the island. The first thing she mentioned was the abandoned ship that we saw earlier, and informed us that it was actually a Carnival Cruise Ship that never made it back home. After she scared the wits out of all the bus passengers, she relieved us with "JUST KIDDING GUYS!" and proceeded to tell us the real history behind the ship. It was actually a cargo ship that got pushed into the bay and sunk during Hurricane Mitch in the 90s. As we zipped through the narrow twisting and turning roads of the island, Joy also told us that there were no speed limits in Honduras, and that STOP signs are merely suggestions. That put us all at ease as well! These tour guides really like to keep you on your toes!

We also learned some pretty interesting information pertaining to the lifestyle here. Teachers actually make more than doctors, and the highest paying salary you can get in Honduras is about \$200 a month flat rate, no overtime. She also pointed out the colorful houses throughout the island and informed us that instead of delivering the mail according to house number, they deliver it according to the color combinations. No two houses have the same roof and house color combination. I also noticed many little Coca-Cola and Pepsi stands on the island. We must have driven by at least 20 of them. She also talked about some of the wildlife here including the Rabbit of Roatan, which she made clear was not like the cute little white fluffy tailed hippity hoppity creatures that we were used to back home in the states. She referred to the rabbits of the island here as "Rabbits on Steroids", and then said, "You'll See". GREAT!!

We soon arrived at Gumbalimba Park which was named after the Gumbalimba Tree. We ventured to Gumbalimba to explore various tropical wildlife such as parrots and capuchin monkeys. Before we could see these beautiful animals, we had to experience a little adventure first!


There was a replica cave dedicated to Pirate Captain John Coxen which we walked through for a short tour. Being that this was a man made cave, I was not expecting it to be inhabited by low flying fruit bats. I had to scream and duck for cover at least twice, giving the less skiddish quite the laugh. We learned a bit about Captain John Coxen here, who was a pirate infamously known for raiding the Gulf of Honduras. He also had an eyepatch and a hook on his hand, which legend has it, a mosquito was flying around his face, and forgetting that he had a hook for a hand, swatted the bug out of the way, and in turn, gauged out his eye. I am not sure how entirely true this legend is, I can't seem to find much about this guy on the internet referring to his hook hand, patched eye, or pegged leg.

After the cave replica, we proceeded across a suspension bridge which stretched out across a murky river filled with turtles. I think we had the most fun on here, and I had flashbacks of my favorite scene in Indiana Jones's "Temple of Doom". We took our time walking across, as it didn't take much for the bridge to start swinging. We finally made it across and didn't realize that Joy was already waiting for us on the other side. There was an alternate, much faster route called "The Chicken Path" for those who were too nervous to cross the suspension bridge. She led us to an area with beautiful Amazon parrots and McCaws resting freely amongst the trees. There was a bird trainer also holding a Green Amazon parrot, allowing people to take their pictures with them. Everyone in our group had lots of fun with this. I allowed the heavy bird to sit on my left shoulder as it squawked ever so loudly in my ear. I've owned birds before, little cockatiels, but this was horse...errr... bird of a different color.

After we had fun with the crazy birds, Joy regrouped us and kind of reminded us about the rules and regulations when dealing with the monkeys. We had bought a locker so I didn't have to bring in any of the bags, because apparently these little guys are quite the pick-pocketers! We were also instructed to leave our water bottles on the benches off to the side while we played with the monkeys. On the way into the monkey reserve, we heard rustling in the bushes. All of the sudden there were these two crazy guinea pig looking animals who were running at at least 25 miles an hour after each other, not even acknowledging the humans in their path. These were the Steroid Bunnies as Joy liked to call them. They really minded their own, but crazy they were indeed! The experience with the monkeys definitely was not long enough. I really wish I could have spent my whole time at this park, in this section. There were also about 30 other people in this section at one time, so your time with your monkey, IF they even came over to you, was pretty abrupt.

The monkeys were allowed to roam here freely, jumping on whoever they deemed interesting at any given moment. There were cute little baby ones and larger adult ones all mixed together. I had some time with about two different monkeys for a few minutes each. They would sit on my shoulder, and climb on my head, resting their human like little fingers on my forehead. The personality they all have is hilarious, and it's crazy how intelligent they are. So intelligent in fact that one of them saw our water bottle over on the bench and must have mistaken it for a toilet bowl because it decided to spray feces all over it! GROSS INDEED! We definitely chucked that right way! On the way back to the park's entrance area we stopped at the Insectarium and Bug Museum which was just a little shack containing thousands of dried species of bugs in glass display cases. There were literally thousands of moths, beetles, roaches, butterflies, filling up each wall with their scientific names next to each.

After we were done here, it was time to head back to the main area to wait for our bus and collect some souvenirs. I bought a cute pair of monkey earrings made from the wood of a coconut tree, a bracelet, and a couple pocket knives in resin cases made from mahogany trees, all from a nice merchant lady. We then were picked up by our shuttle van that was more than scary, twisting and turning once more through the hills of Roatan as it rushed us back to the port to meet our ship. Every day on this trip, was one adventure after the next!





Day 6 was in the Grand Cayman Islands where we had plans to visit a turtle and dolphin park. I was pretty excited to be able to interact with aquatic animals! I did a dolphin interaction experience when I was about 9 years old in Cancun, Mexico, but I think I was too young to really appreciate it. I also was not brave enough. I actually remember clinging to my mother and getting a bit of anxiety over it. I had never experienced being around any sort of exotic animal that young in life, so I was pretty excited to be able to do it again as an adult and kind of redeem myself here. First of all, Grand Cayman was by far the most BEAUTIFUL stop on this trip, and definitely the wealthiest. There were 5 star hotels and resorts all around the island, not to mention the most tourist friendly, with fast food chains every few miles. The boat actually anchored in the ocean at this stop, so we had to take about a 15 minute tender to the docs. Right outside the docks there was a main street filled with nice restaurants, gift shops, trendy galleries, and Jimmy Buffet's Margaritaville. I feel like there's one of those everywhere, hahaha!

So the turtle/dolphin park was about a 20-30 minute drive from the docks. I was pretty groggy on the way there because I had popped a Dramamine tablet in fear of more nausea ruining my day. Had I known the tender ride was so short, I probably would not have done that. Anyway, we got to the park, and were directed to the turtle portion first. It was so amazing to see the sea turtles, which swam in large clusters in the saltwater pool. You could hear the clacking of their shells as they simulated bumper car motions into each other to get to the food that was dropped in, before their friends got to it. You could purchase turtle food to feed them, but we did not. I did not have to feed a turtle to validate my experience here, things are never cheap at these places. I just had a great time observing them from over the balcony, their shells glistening and reflecting the sunlight off the water. It was fun to watch and listen to them as they came up for air, peaking their tiny little heads out of the water, letting out an enormous gasp, sucking all the air back in for the next dive. Turtles can spend long durations underwater and surface only to breathe for about 1 - 3 seconds before going back under. They can replace the air in their lungs in one single breath! Green Sea Turtles have been known to swim up to 35 mph, and males are known to spend their entire lives at sea, rarely, if ever, returning to land. The only two predators the turtle really has to worry about are sharks, and humans, as turtle meat actually remains a traditional dish on the island today, but I will get to that in a little bit!

We roamed the giant sea turtle area for a bit, and even passed by the tank of Smiley, the island's only living crocodile since the mid-1950s. When they captured her in 2008, they ran DNA testing to discover that she was actually a hybrid between two different species of crocodile. Smiley is a 9 foot Saltwater Crocodile, but can survive in both salt and fresh water. This day it was rather hot, and she was hiding under huge palm leaves, so we didn't stop here for too long. We soon made our way to the baby turtle wading pool. This was the part I was so excited about and it even gave us a chance to use Avi's new water cam! We had so much fun with these little guys, I really wish that we got to spend more time with them. They only allowed about 4 people in the pool with them at once, so things felt a bit rushed here. We got to pick them up though, by their shell only, and take some photos with them. Their shells felt so smooth, and were decorated beautifully in different patterns. They also had beautiful patterns on their flapper fins and on their heads. The one I picked up was pretty timid, but the one Avi picked up was rather opinionated! It flapped its little flippers in a fit of range during the duration of our picture taking, until he was put back in the water. After exiting the pool, we washed off our hands and feet at the sanitization station, because turtles and other reptiles have been known to spread Salmonella and other bacterial diseases. Always sanitize after handling reptiles & amphibians!

After our time at the turtle park, we headed over to Dolphin Discovery. I was pretty excited to get some footage of us with the dolphins but the park would not allow us to take in our own camera, even though it was a water camera. It was actually a load of bs, so we had to pay an obscene amount of money for subpar pictures that were taken by their staff... but hey, it worked, so who are the suckers here? I refused to go home without some snapshots of my experience with these wondrous creatures. So back to the actual experience. We suited up in our life vests and followed the photographer staff woman toward the pool we were to enter after the "OK" from our dolphin trainer. We all entered the pool in a single file line; there was a Russian family of 4 in front of Avi and I, then behind us there was another family of 4.


We all entered the pool and stood on the platform as our dolphin trainer introduced himself as Luis. The dolphin that we got to interact with today was Galileo, and he had such a funny personality! Luis would entertain us with some tricks; we would hold our hands out in front of us, and Galileo would start at the front of the line and swim past everyone so we got to run our hands across his cartilage like body & fins. Then he would roll over and come back the other way so we got to do the same to feel his belly. We did this a few times here and there. In between tricks, Luis would enlighten us with more information about dolphins. Like how their fins act as a fingerprint; all dolphins have different series and patterns of ridges on their dorsal fin, which is the fin that stands up on their back. The sound that they make also comes out of their blowholes which they also breathe out of. Dolphins do have sharp little teeth mostly used to catch fish, but not to chew them. They swallow their food whole and can consume up to 30 pounds of food a day.

Dolphins can swim up to 25 mph, which Luis proved when he had Galileo do some diving tricks. One minute the dolphin was in the air, and faster than you can blink, as soon as it hit the water again, it was right back across the pool at Luis's hand for a fishy treat! He did leaps and dives, jumping 20 feet into the air, splashing all of us below! We also did some individual tricks; each one of us got to step out slap our hand on the water and Galileo would swim up to our other hand in the air and touch his nose to it. Then we would put our arms out to his fins and he would lift himself halfway out of the water and use his strong tail to balance and dance with us. This was the cutest trick: we would hold our hands out in a cupped position and when Luis gave him the signal, he would swim over to us, lift his bottled nose and place it into our hands. We would then pucker up for a dolphiny kiss and a photo opp. After my turn, Luis asked if Galileo enjoyed it, and he let out a series of high pitched squeals and squeaks with his head nodding a "yes" motion. Everyone got a laugh out of that!

They really are such playful animals, and as much as I had fun interacting with them in this park that enabled us to, it also made me very sad to see such wondrous creatures in captivity. However, Luis insisted that these dolphins survive longer in these parks which act more like conservations. Apparently, it is hard for dolphins to find a sufficient amount of food in the wild to allow them to live as long as they should, and also they are hunted by sharks or harmed by human conditions. Before our time was up with them, we got to do a few more belly rubs and even throw a piece of fish into Galileo's mouth.

After we finished in the dolphin pool, we did some souvenir shopping and then headed to our bus stop which would take us back to the main strip by the port. While we were waiting, our new friend Courtney who we met on the crazy Cozumel tender, had started up a conversation with Avi regarding how we enjoyed our experience here. She then proceeded to tell us that her and her mother who was standing beside her, were going to check out a restaurant who served this island delicacy of Turtle Burgers. Avi, not really thinking I would go for this asked me, "Would you wanna go eat turtle burgers with them?" I thought about it for maybe a few seconds and though "When in Rome..." I mean, WHY NOT!? When is the next time I'm going to have this adventure? NEVER! Yes, I may have other adventures, but not this same one, right here, right NOW.

So Avi and I took them up on the offer, and joined them at the Paradise Restaurant for some turtle burgers, rice n' beans, and some locally brewed beer. I also spotted some TURTLE SOUP on the menu, which I had asked my cousin Danielle about in our last issue's travel piece about her trip to the Galapagos. She had never had it, but I was determined to find out for myself what this had tasted like! Curiosity had definitely gotten the best of me on this trip, and I was gung-ho about every experience! So Avi and I sunk our teeth into the turtley goodness. Many people ask what it tastes like, and let me just say, I would definitely eat it again. The burgers were a nice reddish crisp on the outside, and the inside texture was somewhat of a slightly undercooked meatloaf. It definitely did not taste like chop meat, but it didn't taste like raw meat eithe;, it was somewhere oddly in between. Courtney and her mom also joked how we must have been just as twisted as them to be playing with cute little baby turtles in a wading pool one minute, and then scarfing them down on a burger bun the next. (Not the same turtles we held, cuz THAT would just be way too weird!) :-P



Q&AWITH REAL LIFE MERMAID! Lily-Rose Sheppard

AZ: So what exactly is your connection to mermaids and how do you apply the mermaid lifestyle to your everyday life?

LRS: Ever since I was a little kid I had felt a strong connetion to the sea, and as soon as I found out about mermaids I was hooked on them! I read every myth and legend I could find about them and memorized them all, so I could tell others. I always believed in mermaids (still do now haha!) and I always felt most comfortable underwater. I apply the mermaid lifestyle to my everyday life by taking nature to heart; if I see litter on the beach, I will go and pick it up and dispose of it properly. I also sing daily, so that always made me feel like a mermaid in a way, as that is a key trait of theirs. I just try my best to be conscious of the world around me and keep an open mind; I try to see the magic in everything!

AZ: So what do you do for a living, and are mermaids involved in your career path?

LRS: Mermaids are definitely involved in my career path in many ways! I'm currently at Tech Music School in London working toward a music degree focused on singing, but I do mermaid events on the side when I can. I also work for an events company doing character work and workshops all over the country. I am hoping to make "Mermaiding" my full time career, and looking into setting up as a business, offering various services with more mermaids.

AZ: That's great! So how did you get into the mermaid events and appearances?

LRS: Completely by accident to be honest, haha! I was looking for mermaid tattoos on Google and mermaid tails for sale came up. I checked it out and fell in love with the tails, so I bought my own! I then emailed around as many places as I could think of to let them know about the mermaid services I could offer them. I waited to hear back, some I got lucky with, others not so much.

AZ: Wow!! So I've been seeing these real life mermaid tails popping up everywhere as well!! What exactly are thuse tails made of, and are the expensive?

LRS: Well my first tail is made from neoprene with a latex overlay and a Finis Foil monofin in the fluke. This was a beautiful tail but unfortunately didn't last very long (less than a year) before it started to show wear and tear. That tail cost me about £500 (\$836.60 USD) with shipping included. My next tail is a Finfolk Productions tail and is costing me approximately £4000 (\$6692.80 USD) with a lot of added

extras and shipping included. This tail is made from pure silicone with a Competitor monofin inside the fluke for extra propulsion. This tail weighs about 30-40 lbs out of water!

AZ: Wow! So you really go swimming with these tails on! Was it hard to adjust to swimming while wearing one? Was that a new learning process for you?

LRS: Oh yea, I try and swim as often as I can at a pool in London to keep in practice and learn new things. For me it wasn't too difficult to pick up as I always used to strap my legs together as a kid and swim like a dolphin! I learned to swim at a young age too, so confidence in the water was never an issue for me either, luckily. I've gotta tell you, the feeling you get when swimming with a tail on is just incredible! The power and grace the tail give you in the water is magnificent! It sounds crazy too, but with the tail on, my breath hold underwater increases! It's like I genuinely don't need as much air because I'm a mermaid haha!

AZ: Wow! Have you ever considered attempting to do free diving (a form of deep sea diving that relies on a diver's ability to hold his or her breath until resurfacing rather than on the use of a breathing apparatus such as scuba gear)? That is an art in it of itself!

LRS: I have been learning to free dive to help enhance my mermaid performance. As a singer, I am used to breathing techniques that are somewhat similar to that of free diving, so this helps me quite a lot, too.

AZ: That is so cool that you are finding ways to incorporate your singing into your mermaid gig... very creative!

LRS: Thanks! I incorporate it into my performance also... I will be appearing at the Folkestone Mermaid Festival in Kent in July, where I will be singing in my brand new tail on the main stage. Also, I will be playing in the shallows on the beach, so I'm looking forward to that at the moment!

AZ: That's so amazing!! What is your favorite bit of mermaid pop culture, either books, movies, artworks, etc.?

LRS: I absolutely love a good mermaid film, I adore Splash, Aquamarine, and of course The Little Mermaid. I read loads of mermaid fiction and any book I can get my hands on about their folklore. I found a beautiful place in Cornwall called Zennor that is steeped in mermaid legend, so I visited it and bought every book about the legend they had, haha!

AZ: Oh wow... I will def have to look into that place myself!! Thank you so much for your interview!!

LRS: You're very

welcome! Thanks for asking me to be a part of it!

know you're probably thinking that the creature above looks an awful lot like a fancier version of a Sea Horse, but don't be mistaken! It is actually a "Leafy Seadragon" or "Glauert's Seadragon", a marine fish in the Syngnathidae family, which also includes seahorses. The two creatures look a lot alike, except the Leafy Sea Dragon looks just like its descriptive name. It has green leaf-like protrusions extending from all over its body, which are not used for functioning propulsion purposes, but rather to camouflage itself from potential predators! These creatures look an awful lot like seaweed to the mistaking eye!

These creatures are slightly larger than seahorses and feed on plankton and other small crustaceans by sucking them up through their pipe-like snout, as they do not have teeth. They are found only in the waters of Southern Australia, which explains why they are the state's marine emblem, and the focus for local conservation. They usually spend their time hanging around kelp covered rocks and clumps of sea grass, over sand patches in waters up to 164 ft. deep!

I first learned about these wondrous creatures while watching The Jeff Corwin Experience, upon a Netflix binge. This show inspired me to find out more information about them, as they are such unique and beautiful creatures! I really wanted to share them with you, and I hope to one day be able to see one up close and personal! However, chances of that are pretty slim since breeding this creature in captivity has so far been unsuccessful! I guess I'll have to take up scuba diving and make a trip to Southern Australia!

Reduce the effects of climate change on the ocean by leaving the car at home when you can and being conscious of your energy use at home and work. A few things you can do to get started today: Switch to compact fluorescent light bulbs, take the stairs, and bundle up or use a fan to avoid oversetting your thermostat.

2. Make Safe, Sustainable Seafood Choices

Global fish populations are rapidly being depleted due to demand, loss of habitat, and unsustainable fishing practices. When shopping or dining out, help reduce the demand for overexploited species by choosing seafood that is both healthful and sustainable.

3. Use Fewer Plastic Products

Plastics that end up as ocean debris contribute to habitat destruction and entangle and kill tens of thousands of marine animals each year. To limit your impact, carry a reusable water bottle, store food in nondisposable containers, bring your own cloth tote or other reusable bag when shopping, and recycle whenever possible.

4. Help Take Care of the Beach

Whether you enjoy diving, surfing, or relaxing on the beach, always clean up after yourself. Explore and appreciate the ocean without interfering with wildlife or removing rocks and coral. Go even further by encouraging others to respect the marine environment or by participating in local beach cleanups.

5. Don't Purchase Items That Exploit Marine Life

Certain products contribute to the harming of fragile coral reefs and marine populations. Avoid purchasing items such as coral jewelry, tortoiseshell hair accessories (made from hawksbill turtles), and shark products.

6. Be an Ocean-Friendly Pet Owner

Read pet food labels and consider seafood sustainability when choosing a diet for your pet. Never flush cat litter, which can contain pathogens harmful to marine life. Avoid stocking your aquarium with wild-caught saltwater fish, and never release any aquarium fish into the ocean or other bodies of water, a practice that can introduce non-native species harmful to the existing ecosystem.

7. Support Organizations Working to Protect the Ocean

Many institutes and organizations are fighting to protect ocean habitats and marine wildlife. Find a national organization and consider giving financial support or volunteering for hands-on work or advocacy. If you live near the coast, join up with a local branch or group and get involved in projects close to home.

8. Influence Change in Your Community

Research the ocean policies of public officials before you vote or contact your local representatives to let them know you support marine conservation projects. Consider patronizing restaurants and grocery stores that offer only sustainable seafood, and speak up about your concerns if you spot a threatened species on the menu or at the seafood counter.

9. Travel the Ocean Responsibly

Practice responsible boating, kayaking, and other recreational activities on the water. Never throw anything overboard, and be aware of marine life in the waters around you. If you're set on taking a cruise for your next vacation, do some research to find the most eco-friendly option.

10. Educate Yourself About Oceans and Marine Life




